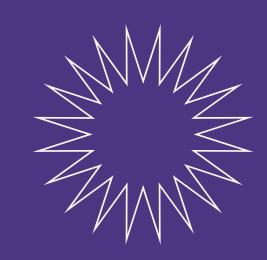
What I liked most about my team was how we literally



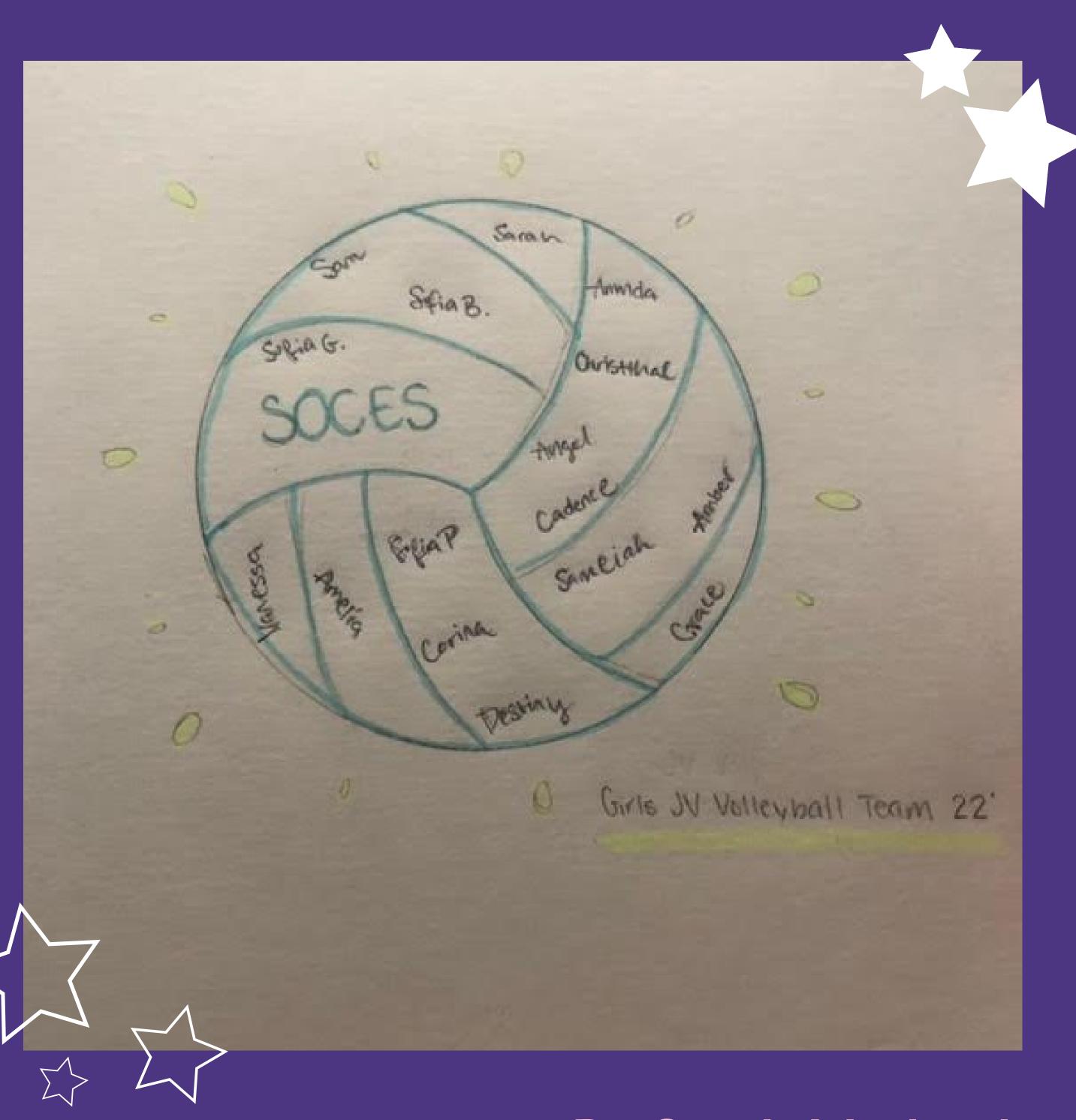

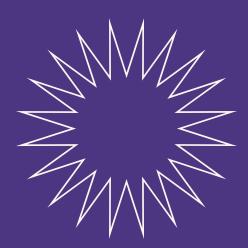
